Why the series of advice bulletins on Catholic school funding?

Put simply, the Federal Government in its implementation of the Gonski Review of school funding insisted on considering the individual family's capacity to contribute. Private, Catholic, and other religious-based schools will need to increase fees if the income profile of the families they enrol is higher than average. Mackay district is one such area of higher incomes. Funding to most of our Catholic schools will decrease over the next five years. To reach the agreed level of school funding per student (SRS – Student Resources Standard) the percentage our fees recoup will need to increase from approximately 20% to 32%.

Our challenge is to maintain quality and economy for families, but we are committed to doing so.


